## A History of the Music Video: Technique and Development

## Course Description and Expectations

In this course we will discuss together the history of music videos, the various techniques through which artists present their ideas using the media, and innovations in directing and editing techniques prevalent in music videos. Each class meeting will consist of relatively open ended discussion, starting with a short presentation deconstructing one or two aspects of the media. The expectation at the end of this course is for students to look at not just music videos, but all film based media more critically to gain a deeper appreciation for this wonderful artform we have constructed.

## **Course Assignments and Grading**

The course is graded on a P/NP basis. Due to the nature of the DeCal institution, NP grades are highly unexpected. Nevertheless, effort and participation is crucial to successfully pass this course, and as such attendance and participation will be large part of the grade.

Furthermore, each student will be expected to prepare a small typed response (at least one well-thought out paragraph) to a music video each week in which they will discuss themes,

techniques, or anything else interesting to them from that video. These responses will be graded on the basis of completion and effort, and altogether these responses will contribute to a non-trivial percent of the overall grade.

Each student will also be expected to present one music video to the class and discuss briefly (5 minutes minimum), the aspects of that video they find interesting. Student will still be expected to submit a response the week of a presentation, but organized notes for their presentation are acceptable in lieu of a few typed paragraphs. These presentations are important for students to begin analyzing music videos on their own, and to also become more comfortable in the context of the class, and so these presentations will also contribute to a non-trivial percent of the overall grade, with grading based on enthusiasm and effort.

Lastly, there will be a final project, done in groups of at most 4. Not surprisingly, this project will be to create a music video. This can be done by filming your own footage, animation, compilation of various clips, or any other format discussed in class or one that you find fitting and doable. This project will demonstrate your understanding of the material covered in class, and as such it will be a large portion of your grade. The project will be graded on the basis of completion and effort.

All materials for the course will be posted on the course website. Students are encouraged to look through all supplementary information presented each week for their weekly response and short presentation. Final projects will also be shared on the course website with the permission of the creators, in hopes that future classes may look to them for inspiration and entertainment.

A concrete breakdown of grading is below:

A minimum of 75% and a completed presentation and final project is required to pass the course without additional discussion.
